Mocs lose 28-27 to The Citadel after leading 27-0

The Citadel never gave up Saturday, even when it was getting demolished. The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, meanwhile, never responded when the Bulldogs failed to roll over in the second half.

Down 27-0 in the third quarter, The Citadel rallied for four touchdowns and handed the 17th-ranked Mocs a "devastating" 28-27 Southern Conference loss Saturday night at Finley Stadium. The crowd of 10,727 were stunned as the game came to an end after it began

with everything going UTC's way.

"I don't even know how to describe what happened," Mocs safety Jordan Tippit said. "I don't want to say we relaxed. I don't want to say that at all, but I'm pretty sure that's probably what it looked like."

Before ranting about everything the Mocs did wrong in the second half,

and there was much to cover, a highly agitated coach Russ Huesman first gave credit to the Bulldogs.

"I'm going to start by saying that was an unbelievable effort by Citadel," he said. "Unbelievable effort. For them to be down 27-0 and come back and win that football game is unbelievable."

Huesman went on to say that UTC's coaches did a "horrible job" in the second half.

As The Citadel (2-2, 1-2) rallied, the Mocs (2-3, 0-2) had numerous chances to regroup. But it never happened.

After UTC's lead was cut to 27-21 midway through the fourth quarter, the Mocs started the ensuing drive at their 33-yard line — and quarterback B.J. Coleman was sacked for a 13-yard loss on first down. UTC eventually had to punt and The Citadel marched down the field for the winning touchdown. Darien Robinson sparked the drive with a 39-yard run and then scored from the 3 to put the visitors up 28-27 with 2:24 remaining.

"It's devastating," Coleman said of the loss, which

Rogers catches two of Bray's four TDs

KNOXVILLE — Buffalo receiver Saron Hood burst through Tennessee's punt-protection unit and blocked Matt Darr's kick with time winding down in the fourth quarter.

"It was embarrassing," Volunteers coach Derek Dooley said. "They rush one guy. We just release. It was lazy."

But Darr scooped up the ball and ran 30 yards for a first down.

That's the type of easy afternoon the

Vols had Saturday in a 41-10 nonconference win at Neyland Stadium.

It might be the last such afternoon for a while.

"We did what we needed to do," Dooley said. "It was a good win. This team had played every team they had played close, and they didn't today. Now we turn our attention to what lies ahead."

Georgia visits Knoxville this Saturday night on a three-game winning streak. Then

Vols clearly look better, but is it better enough?

KNOXVILLE — University of Tennessee football coach Derek Dooley stopped his answer in mid-sentence, a bemused smile washing over his face.

Spying his 7-year-old daughter Juliana in the media room beneath Neyland Stadium, he said, "Those glasses look good on you, sweetie."

And they did, though you didn't need eyeglasses to see how good Dooley's Volunteers looked in Saturday's

41-10 victory over Buffalo. You needed only numbers, which showed the Big Orange nearly doubling the little Bulls in yardage (511-267) and time of possession (38:10 to 21:50) and more than doubling them in first downs (26-10).

Take away Buffalo quarterback Chazz Johnson's 68-yard touchdown run on a busted defensive assignment late in the first period and two misplayed kickoffs and it was nearly a perfect game for the Vols.

Even the cautious, caustic Dooley had a hard time being too negative about the performance.

"It was a good win," he said. "[Buffalo] has played every team they've played close, but they didn't today."

Indeed, though the Bulls' only win in five games was against Stony Brook,

Riddle races to record

A remarkable Riddle left no question Saturday in the 2011 StumpJump 50k trail race.

And Nashville's Lindsay Beckner made her first trail competition a victorious one as the women's overall winner.

Cincinnati resident David Riddle broke the race record and shattered the "new course" standard by finishing the 31-mile run from Signal Mountain Middle/High School and back in 3 hours, 49 minutes, 52 seconds.

Andy Anderson, a Baylor School graduate who grew up on the mountain and lives now in Truckee, Calif., also broke the previous best of 4:15 on the current course but was nearly 18 minutes behind Riddle in 4:07:41. The race record had been 4:01.

Johnny Clemons, Dennis Bauer and John Brower were third through fifth Saturday in 4:20:13, 4:37:33 and 4:47:33, and 10 others finished in under five hours.

Beckner was 33rd overall in 5:22:27, and female runner-up Wendy Wright was 34th in 5:23:11. The third woman, Shannon Wells, was 38th in 5:28:33.

Former Lakeview-Fort Oglethorpe and Bryan College runner Jacob Bradley was the 11-mile winner in 1:21:14, beating 2010 winner Jack McAfee by 62 seconds, and Shannon Hutchinson had the fastest female time of 1:41:38 in the shorter race.

"The trail is awesome."

Pickens trips Lady Ramblers

DALTON, Ga. — The opening day of a region softball tournament is full of perils for the top seeds. After working all season to position themselves for the playoffs, a first-day tournament loss means having to fight back.

In competitive Region 7-AAA it happens nearly every season and it did again — almost twice — Saturday at Dalton's Heritage Point Park. The four top seeds played winners from the morning session, and only third-seeded Heritage escaped without any drama.

While the Generals were dispatching Cartersville 12-1 in five innings, second-seeded Ringgold was escaping Dalton's upset bid, 5-4, and top-seeded Allatoona edged Gilmer County 4-2. Fourth-seeded LaFayette, however, was not as fortunate. The

Lady Ramblers fell 3-2 in eight innings to Pickens County.

"This is traditionally a round where you get an upset or two," Heritage coach Steve Chattin said following the Generals' easy win. "As you go on you have to play better. Even though we can't complain about the way we hit it today, we have to be even more consistent starting Monday."

Heritage will take on Ringgold and Allatoona will play Pickens in Monday's 7 p.m. winners-bracket semifinals, after Saturday's losers face off at 5.

Heritage (22-7) broke open a 4-1 game with eight fourth-inning runs, sparked by Jesslyn Stockard's two-run double and Allison Vaughn's two-run triple. Stockard, Amber Burton,

Brandy Goldsmith and Kristin West each had two hits.

Ringgold's (18-9) narrow win followed a 14-2 regular-season romp Thursday at Dalton. The Lady Catacombs weren't so giving Saturday, breaking out to a 3-0 lead on Carson Hagin's first-inning homer. However, Ringgold scored single runs in each of the first five innings, Hayley Robinson's second solo homer providing the winning margin in the fifth.

"The ball was flying out here today," Ringgold coach Rachel Hodge said. "We scrapped back with a run here and there. We played well and Hayley hit it well, but it's hard to come out every day like we did the other day against them with 17 hits. You have to win one like this every now and then.

Softball is a game of inches and it's postseason, so you should expect 5-4 games."

LaFayette (16-13) lost in frustrating fashion to Pickens when the Lady Ramblers had runners on third and second in the bottom of the eighth inning and could not score. After Pickens' Kennedy McTaggart's single in the top of the eighth gave the Lady Dragons a 3-2 lead, LaFayette had the potential tying and winning runs in scoring position after Madison Queen blooped a double to right to open the bottom half.

However, Shelby Narmore, who drove in the Lady Ramblers' earlier two runs, hit a fly ball to right and Jessica Ingram was out on a close play at home after tagging from third. The next batter popped out to end the game.

It's a beautiful course and it's tough," Riddle said after setting his "seventh or eighth" 50 trail record. "It was the most elevation [5,000 feet] I've ever done in a race, and it's pretty technical as well."

He started pulling away by the five-mile mark and his only difficulty, he said, was getting "almost too excited coming back from the Indian Rock House" and struggling up the climb from Suck Creek. "But once I got to the top I started pumping again."

Riddle, 30, had trained all summer for the World 100k road competition three weeks ago in the Netherlands as a member of the United States team but had an inner-ear problem and failed to finish.

"I was running with some fire in my step today," he said. "I wanted to put all that work to use."

He ran for Bob Jones High School in Huntsville and as a walk-on at Auburn University, where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in aerospace engineering, but "was nothing special."

"I can't explain it. I'm pretty decent on roads but no standout, but it's like I can float across the trails," he said. "And I haven't taken a day off from running in five years."

His wife is in her second year of residency at Cincinnati Children's Hospital, and Riddle works for GE Aviation there.

"We make jet engines," he said.

He seemed like one was propelling him Saturday.

Anderson has a couple of interesting jobs. In the winter he's an avalanche predictor in the Lake Tahoe area, and in warm weather he's a climbing rescue ranger in Rocky Mountain National Park.

Women's winner Beckner is a restaurant consultant. The 29-year-old Harpeth Hall and Vanderbilt alumna grew up as a competitive swimmer but has been a runner for a
